Caring and the Professional Practice of Nursing

Falk-Rafael (1996) proposed that caring in nursing has evolved from an ordered (or required) caring (associated with characteristics such as nurturing), to an assimilated caring (as nursing developed into an autonomous profession), and then further evolved to an empowered caring (as individual nurses realized nursing interactions support caring connections) within an interprofessional healthcare delivery system that has an ever-changing power base.

A few states allow parents who hold nursing degrees to be paid for the care they provide to their own children.
