Browning's contribution to the form is one of subtlety of characterization and complexity of the dramatic situation, which the reader gradually pieces together from the casual remarks or digressions of the speaker. The subject discussed is usually far less interesting than what is inadvertently revealed about the speaker himself.

Answer: Robert Browning is often considered the master of the form of the dramatic monologue – if not the first to “inaugurate [the first] to perfect this poetic form...” (Lennartz 418) – Especially poems in which the speaker silences his auditor through intimidation. Browning's speakers are often aggressive and threatening.

Robert Browning was a prolific poet and at times his poetry drew a stark contrast to that of his famous wife Elizabeth Barrett Browning, who was a rather gentle poet. A perfect example is his dramatic monologue, "My Last Duchess," which is a dark and daring portrait of a domineering man.

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Browning's magnum opus was *The Ring and the Book* (1868-9), a set of twelve dramatic monologues in which opening and closing reflections frame ten speakers who between them expound the trial in 1698 of Count Guido Franceschini for the murder of his wife.
